On 1 October 2010, the Equality Act 2010 replaced all existing equality legislation such as the Race Relations Act, Disability Discrimination Act and Sex Discrimination Act. It has consolidated this legislation and also provides some changes, but for the most part the effect of the law is the same as it has been in the past – schools, which are already complying with the law, will not find major differences in what they need to do.

It is unlawful for a school to discriminate against a pupil or prospective pupil by treating them less favourably because of their sex, race, disability, religion or belief, sexual orientation gender reassignment, pregnancy or maternity. The term "protected characteristics" is used as a convenient way to refer to the categories to which the law applies.

Honley Junior School's Statement of Equality.

We believe that equality at our School should permeate all aspects of School life and is the responsibility of every member of the School and wider community. Every member of the School community should feel safe, secure, valued and of equal worth.

At our School, equality is a key principle for treating all people the same irrespective of their gender (including transgender, maternity and pregnancy), ethnicity, disability, religious beliefs, sexual orientations, and marital status.
